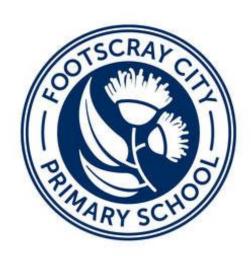

WESTERN MELBOURNE AREA PRINCIPAL FORUM



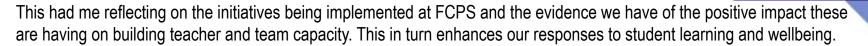
There were also case study presentations from Principals across the Area, showcasing their leadership in key DE priority areas. To have the opportunity to step into this professional learning environment and 'lift my chin' from the daily reality of school leadership and think with the system view was both inspiring about future possibilities and confirming of the great programs and practices happening at FCPS.

From Deputy Secretary David Howes we heard some key messages that he encouraged us to share with our staff and communities. He reiterated that we are a high performing system that is producing outstanding outcomes. He referenced Victoria's NAPLAN results as leading other States and Territories, particularly in reading and despite being the State which experienced the longest period of school closures during the COVID-19 pandemic. He referenced our attendance data which as a key indicator of student health and wellbeing which is also amongst the highest in the country. David's message was clear:

- 1. The quality of our leadership is strong
- 2. The challenges are immediate and real
- 3. Collectively, we have the opportunity and the resources to work towards being a universal high-performing system

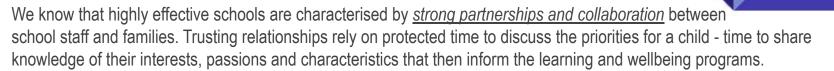

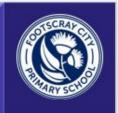
PARENT TEACHER INTERVIEWS AND PSG/SSG MEETINGS



Our <u>Parent-Teacher Interviews and the PSG/SSG Meeting Program</u> offer this opportunity for parents/carers and school staff, and we are proud to have implemented this program within what is a very short (9 week) first term.

Thank you to families for your commitment to this opportunity and for the insights you have provided. Our teaching staff have spoken of the power of this time with you and how they benefit from the opportunity to both listen attentively and share their knowledge of their students. The majority of classroom teachers were released for these meetings by our leadership team. This enabled our leaders to be in classrooms teaching the students (we LOVED it!) and provided continuity for the children as they were taught by known educators. It's also a cost-effective model - to release all classroom teachers for these meetings costs in excess of \$10 000!!

The <u>Program/Student Support Group</u> meetings are an extension of the Parent/Teacher Interviews, offered as an alternative to families whose child meets the DE criteria for these termly/semesterly meetings based on their learning needs and/or disabilities. Attended by teachers, school leaders and in some cases our Education Support staff and members of allied health teams, these meetings are precious protected time that informs targeted supports and interventions. This meeting program is a significant logistical undertaking with the number of families participating (from Year 1 - Year 6) requiring a 4 week meeting schedule. We thank families for their support of this work, their patience as they await their meeting and for the trust that is placed in the school.



FOOTSCRAY LEARNING PRECINCT

Our membership of the Footscray Learning Precinct is a privilege and the opportunity to partner with our colleagues at Footscray High School, Footscray Primary School and the Billy Button Children's Centre is something that we treasure. To collaborate with respected colleagues and leaders so as to improve the outcomes in our own education settings and that of all precinct education settings connects to our shared moral purpose. Improving the lives and opportunities of children and families is what brought us to our jobs, and here we are doing it together. It's a fantastic initiative and a defining time for us all.

One of the priorities of the FLP is that we enhance the learning pathways and transitions for all children and young people at all stages of learning - early childhood to primary, primary to secondary and secondary to tertiary/VCAL and workplace settings.

With this priority at the forefront, we were thrilled to welcome the leadership team of Footscray High School to FCPS earlier this month to a presentation for Year 4 - 6 families of FCPS. Frank Vetere (Executive Principal) was joined by his leadership and wellbeing team of Maria Chrisant (Pilgrim Campus Principal), John Box (Barkley Campus Principal), Vicky Tentzoglidis (Kinnear Campus Principal), Emma Crampton (Transitions Coordinator) and Katie Souter (Junior Inclusion Coordinator). To have all members of the Principal class team attend and speak to our families is testimony to their shared commitment and passion.

Speaking with great pride about the program and learning pathways for students at Footscray High School, it was great to hear this first hand and to understand further how the transition of students from primary to secondary is supported through close collaboration and extensive data collection. It was also enlightening for parents/carers to hear about the transitions within high school, such as from Year 9 to Year 10 when students move to the senior campus @ Kinnear.

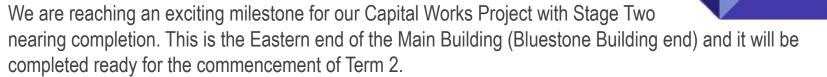

CAPITAL WORKS PROJECT



Over the school holidays we will be moving into the new learning spaces ready to welcome our **Year 5 and Year 6 students** in bright and inviting learning communities.

Already students have been part of our selection of furniture for these learning communities through a series of workshops. This has seen us draw student voice and inclusive design principles that allow for student choice within the learning environment based on their preferences and needs. This is also the approach we took for Stage 1 of the project and those choice also included input from students and staff.

From Term 2, the Bowden Construction team will commence on the 3rd and final stage of the project which is the refurbishment of Western end of the Main Building (railway end) and this intended for completion ready for Term 4.

- all other allied health practitioners.

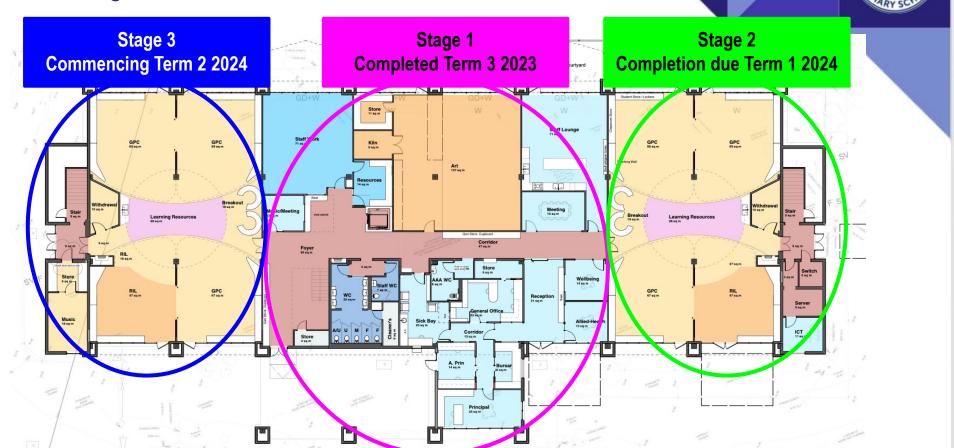

This means the 'need to know' framework also applies to all school staff, whether employees, service providers (contractors) and agents (whether paid or unpaid) of the Department.

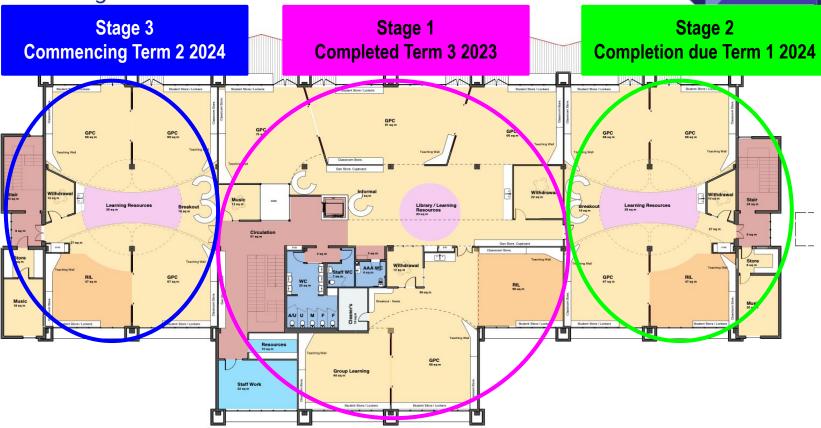

The Rocket for STEAM

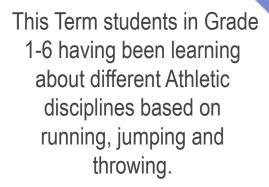

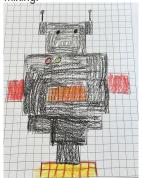

Foundation Art have been learning about the order of the colour spectrum ROY.G.BIV leading to exploring colour mixing.



Grade 1 and 2 have been exploring shape through robots.



The Art Program has been using new LCD drawing boards as a learning and calming transition tool for students in Grade 1 to 6.











Grade 3 to 6 students started the Term with rotating choice based activities exploring the theme of Chinese New Year of the Dragon. This has moved into a clay unit exploring design, clay joining techniques and the Art Element of Form.

Through singing and body percussion, Year 1&2 students have learnt about the metre *Common Time* and musical structure (form). The students have re-written song lyrics using their rhythm understandings.

Foundation students have been singing, keeping a steady beat, sharing the instruments and taking turns in our music games! Whilst singing they are exploring high/low and loud/soft sounds with their voices.



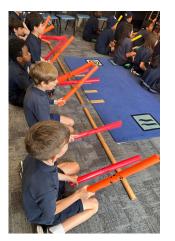


Specialist Learning Programs

To start our new school year, Juniors students have been exploring the zodiac stories of the Lunar New Year, and learning about different festive traditions and customs. They also created different LNY-themed crafts as part of our celebration.

Senior students worked on their Chinese calligraphy, spending time to practise both keystrokes and full characters.









Specialist Learning Programs

STEAM

The year has commenced with an exciting start in the new STEAM program at Footscray City. This term, we've focused on Physical Science, engaging students across various year levels with tailored content.

Preps have been exploring movement, learning how forces like pushing and pulling affect objects.

Years 1 and 2 have looked into simple machines, understanding their role in facilitating movement.

Years 3 and 4 have investigated how heat is produced and transferred, exploring the basics of thermal energy.

Year 5 students have studied light, examining how it can be manipulated and its various effects.

Finally, Year 6 has delved into energy transformation, focusing on how energy can be converted to generate electricity.









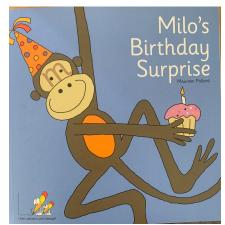




Foundation Learning Community

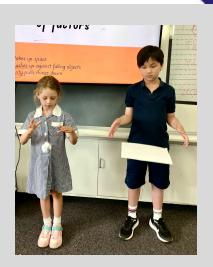
Year 1 & 2 Learning Community



In our Physical Science unit, Year 1/2 students have been learning that the way objects move depends on a variety of factors. Students have been exploring pushes, pulls and friction. This week, students conducted a range of experiments exploring how air takes up space, how air pushes up against falling objects and how gravity pulls things down.

In Year 4, we have been exploring and writing Acknowledgements of Country.

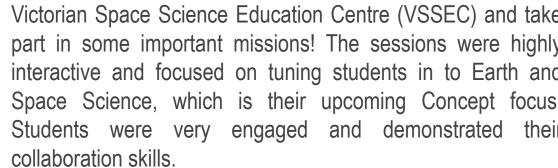
We begun by reading 'Welcome to Country' by Aunty Joy Murphy, then each student created their own unique Acknowledgement of Country.

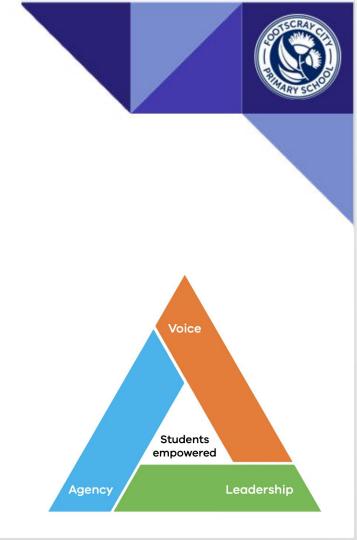
What is SWPBS?

- A whole-school problem solving framework
- A multi-tiered system of support to promote academic and behavioural outcomes
- A whole-school model for effective professional learning supported by coaching
- When implemented with fidelity, SWPBS is effective at:
 - Reducing behavioural incidents (Morrissey, Bohanon & Fenning, 2010)
 - Having a positive effect on academic skills (Algozzine, Wang & Violette, 2011)

We are running 4 Curriculum Days in 2024, as per the Victorian Government Schools Agreement (VGSA). This allows for professional learning and collaboration for our teaching and education support staff, and for the development and provision of Student Report Cards.

Please note there will be an additional <u>Pupil Free Day</u> run in 2024 as staff are entitled to a Professional Practice Day under the VGSA. We are in the process of determining this date as it requires input from the 2024 teaching staff (a requirement under the VGSA). This will then be presented to School Council for approval and communicated to parents/carers as a matter of priority.

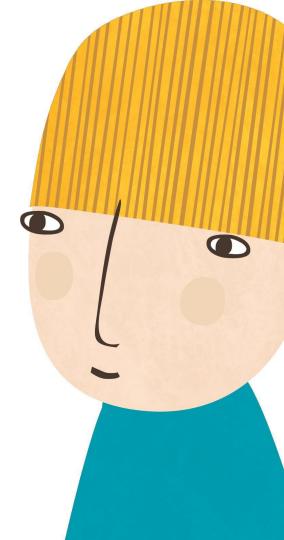
Victoria's Child Safe Standards

- Child Safe Standard 1 Establish a culturally safe environment in which the diverse and unique identities and experiences of Aboriginal children and young people are respected and valued.
- Child Safe Standard 2 Ensure that child safety and wellbeing are embedded in school leadership, governance and culture.
- Child Safe Standard 3 Children and young people are empowered about their rights, participate in decisions affecting them and are taken seriously.
- Child Safe Standard 4 Families and communities are informed and involved in promoting child safety and wellbeing.
- Child Safe Standard 5 Equity is upheld and diverse needs are respected in policy and practice.
- Child Safe Standard 6 People working with children and young people are suitable and supported to reflect child safety and wellbeing values in practice.

- Child Safe Standard 7 Ensure that processes for complaints and concerns are child focused.
- Child Safe Standard 8 Staff and volunteers are equipped with the knowledge, skills and awareness to keep children and young people safe through ongoing education and training.
- Child Safe Standard 9 Physical and online environments promote safety and wellbeing while minimising the opportunity for children and young people to be harmed.
- Child Safe Standard 10 Implementation of the Child Safe Standards is regularly reviewed and improved.
- Child Safe Standard 11 Policies and procedures that document how schools are safe for children, young people and students.
- Ministerial Order 1359 provides the framework for child safety in schools.

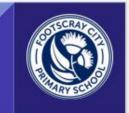

Victorian <u>Child Safe Standards</u> Why child safety is so important . . .



Our school is committed to the safety and wellbeing of all children. We want children attending our school to be safe, happy and respected.

The Child Safe Standards recognise that all children are vulnerable and require schools to take steps to prevent child abuse and build a culture of child safety.

Schools cannot assume that child abuse does not and cannot happen within their school or school community.
